

Tips for Effective Posting on Social Media

Engage your fans. When you're promoting an event, it can be tempting to only post key information and move on. But if you want readers to really notice your message, it's important to craft a catchy, conversational post. Also use bright colors, catchy graphics and engaging imagery to keep people's interest and attention. By asking questions, soliciting feedback, posting pictures and asking your readers to share your post, you are far more likely to get everyone excited for your digital safety event.

Share the right information. When you craft your message, take the time to reflect on all the information you need to cover. Whether it's for Facebook or Instagram, be as concise as possible with the who, what, when, where and why, keeping in mind that most readers won't read lengthy paragraphs of text. Best practice is to keep posts at a minimum of 140 characters.

Use hashtags and links. Make sure you tag [@NationalPTA](#) on Twitter or Instagram and [National Parent Teacher Association](#) on Facebook. Then, use our official hashtag **#TheSmartTalk** in your social media messaging. You can also include **#PTAProud** and **#SID2020** for Safer Internet Day. It's helpful to add a link that directs users to a webpage for more information. You can insert a link with your social media messaging that will direct users to your PTA website, a news article or blog.
